Before anything else, protect yourself:


- 1. Turn off electricity and gas immediately
- 2. Wear waterproof boots, gloves, and an N95 mask
- 3. Never step into standing water unless the power is confirmed off


Document everything with photos and video—you'll need this for insurance and contractors.

Mold starts to grow in as little as **24–48 hours**. That's why timing is critical:

- 1. Use a wet vac or pump to remove standing water
- 2. Open windows and run dehumidifiers (rent them locally if needed)
- 3. Tear out wet carpet and drywall if soaked more than 2 inches

DIY can only go so far. If you notice:


- 1. Musty smells after 2 days
